but what other little surprises could be waiting for the AFL's new pilot?

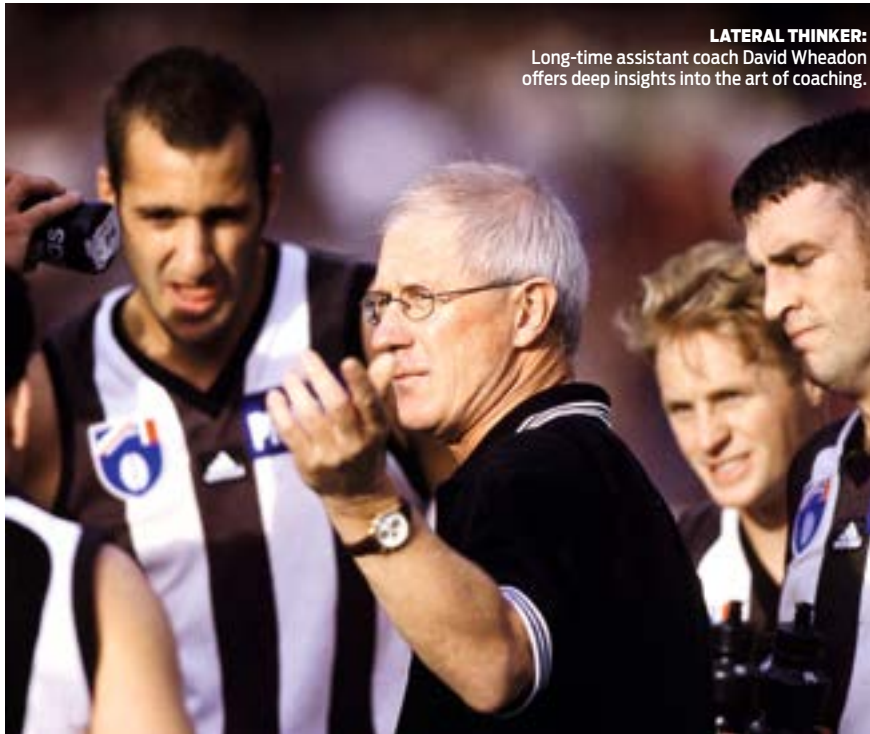

FROM THE INSIDE

A new take on coaching

When one of football's most lateral thinkers puts pen to paper, it's time to put down pens and read.

David Wheadon's book *The Art of Coaching* delivers on its promise to explain and expose some of the real questions that occupy the time of football clubs.

That he manages to do so in a readable and accessible manner makes it a must read for coaches, assistant coaches and players at all senior levels and should also be part of an induction showbag for every prospective or current board member of an AFL club, or the AFL Commission.

After a slow but necessary start explaining the fundamentals of coaching, Wheadon gets moving midway through when he starts explaining how to teach skill, analyse the game and create a game-plan.

Think about the five performance characteristics Wheadon outlines for what separates the elite from a sub-elite player: anthropometric (body-size), physiological (athleticism), technical (technique), tactical

(decision-making) and psychological (mental) and suddenly you have the basis for assessing what might be the strengths and weaknesses of the stars we analyse on a weekly and annual basis.

Look at Jack Watts, Nic Naitanui or Chad Wingard through that lens and you might have a more measured response to what they need to work on.

It is just one example of the type of simple explanations this book contains that clarifies what can often be a confusing game.

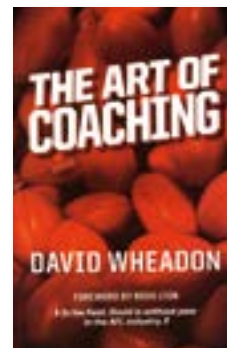
His final three chapters on the art of goalkicking are classics, a timely update on the aspect of the game that confounds us all.

Wheadon has a long history of involvement at the coalface at successful clubs, being on the coaching staff of three premiership teams – Essendon in 1993 and Geelong in 2007 and 2009.

This publication sits comfortably next to his two other classic publications *Drills and Skills in Australian Rules Football* (1989) and *Tactics in the Modern Game* (1991). **✎**
