"That put the other horses off the bit, and from there the pressure dropped off behind

"Of course when you put on that sort of pace you're going to tank out, but she was gutsy and brave at the finish when Girl Guide flew at her.

"In the end the margin was half a nose, but a win's a win - the margin doesn't make any difference to the result."

The Bounty Queen's time of

58.46 seconds over the kilometre gave her an average speed of over 60kph, and she was very close to setting a class record at the track.

"I looked up the class record and she was only a few hundredths of a second off it -abee's whisker really – which is incredible," Ledger said.

"That's everything outside your open category of Black Caviar and the like, so basically out of all the 1000m races at Moonee Valley with

any restrictions.

"If you think about how many of those there has been over the years it is a terrific performance, and it was even more so because she had to give 2kg to the favorite, so she was carrying a lot more weight."

Ledger is now eyeing the Albury Gold Cup's famous 'Flat Knacker' – a 900m sprint with a prize purse of \$50,000.

"I'd love to take her to the Albury Cup," he said.

"Every trainer who has a horse in the Flat Knacker thinks their horse is the fastest in the world, but I'm very confident Bounty Queen could

"Sometimes she needs 3-4 weeks off after a race - this would give her 18 days, which should be just about right, but if we feel that she needs more time we won't run her.'
